

## Weekly Cyber Threat Intelligence Bulletin

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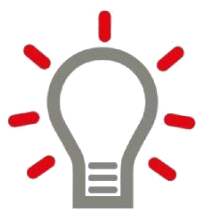
An Indian bank has been forced to reissue debit cards. This appears to be due to a ATM related malware. Hitachi, responsible for the ATM network, have begun an audit of the compromised machines. More information [here](#).
